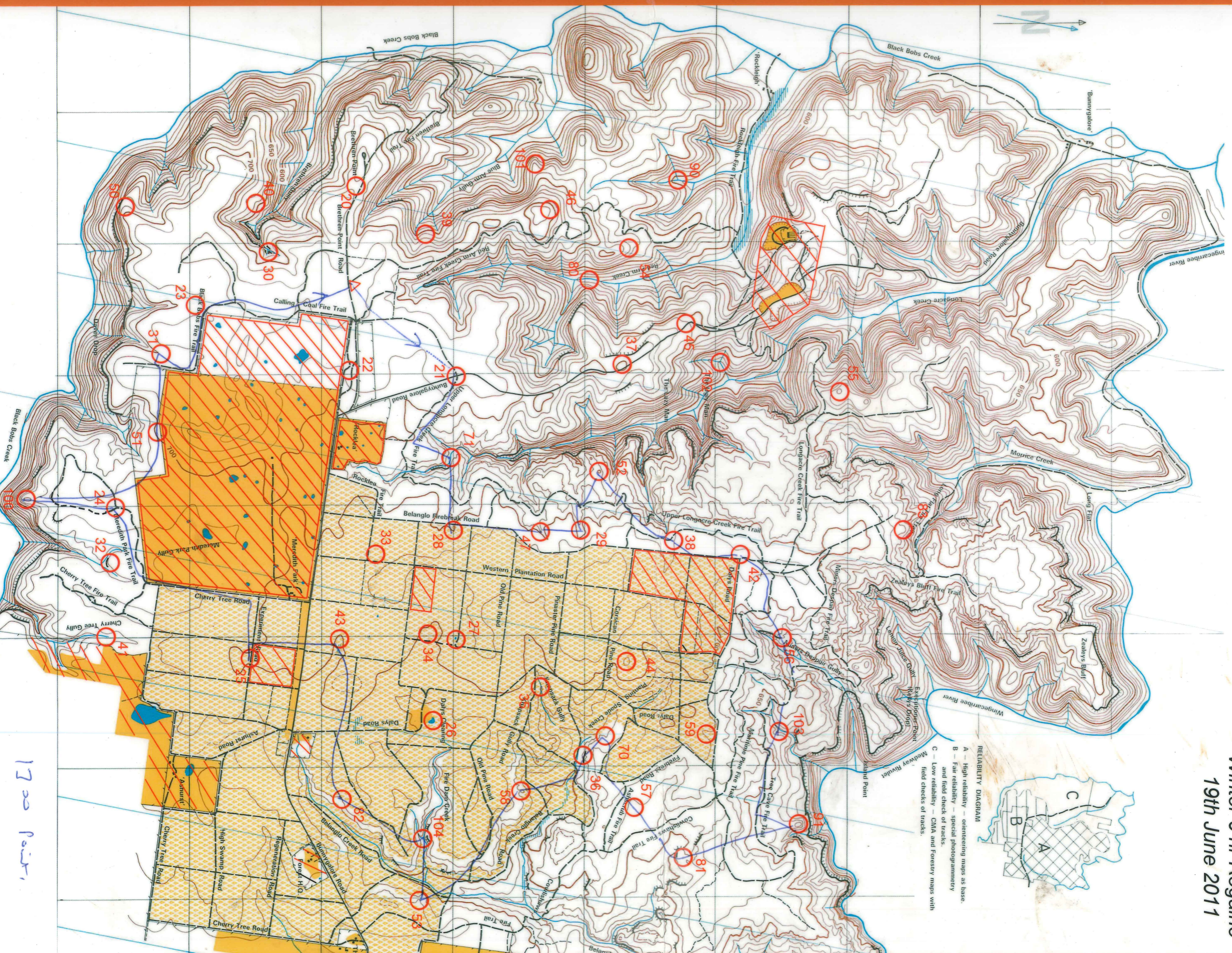

20	The shallow saddle	
21	The track junction	
22	A small clear area	Track detail does not completely match the map
23	The gully junction	
24	The track junction	The flag is approx 10m S of the junction
25	The road	A very shallow saddle, flag is approx 5m S of road
26	The dam, N side	Daly's Clearing is the official campsite for Belanglo State Forest. Enjoy the loo, if required!
27	The pond (puddle), SE side	Don't get your feet wet ...
28	The gully	
29	The gully	
30	The gully junction	A really pretty spot! There are rock dropoffs - best approaches are down the gully slopes. 30 to 40 is not possible by continuing down and up the creeks. It is possible to contour between the upper and lower cliff lines S of 30 at a height just above that of 30 - if you take this route, give the undercut lips into the side and main gullies plenty of clearance.

32	The broad spur	Approximately 15m back from the cliff edge
33	No defined feature	How do you find this? Recovery strategy - how do you know if you've missed it?
34	A man made object	Almost a gully

37	The knoll, W side

39	The spur, below a large rock outcrop	
40	The gully	Important - see notes for 30

42	The backpacker memorial	
43	The marshy area, W end	
44	The knoll, centre	
45	The spur	Approximately 80m from the road

50	The bend in the spur	
51	The fence bend	The fence bend is approx 100m further east than shown on the map. The map has not been corrected.
52	The knoll, between rock outcrops	Is this what you expect from the contours?
53	The rock outcrop

56	The rock outcrop, towards N end of the cliff line	
57	The very shallow gully - indistinct	How do you find this? What is your recovery strategy - how do you know if you've missed it?
58	Between the rock outcrops	An interesting formation
59	The shallow gully	Difficult from the south
70	The gully and hanging gully junction	
71	The gully	Steep both sides, with several rock ledges to work around, but doable
80	The watercourse	
81	The spur	The rock outcrop, a high point
82	A distinctive rock 20m north of the shallow	The map shows a vegetation boundary, but the natives have been intergrown with self-seeded pines. It is clearly different from pine plantation. There is a rock actually in the gully, too, but not the rock you want.
83	The spur, a large broken rock outcrop area	
90	The gully junction	
91	The knoll	
100	The knoll	The high point of the knoll, towards the S of the contour ellipse. The track bend as originally marked on the map was too far east and south.
101	The spur	
102	The gully junction	Another really pretty spot! The track junction/roads to the NNW are incorrectly shown and have not been corrected on the map. Contours are a fair representation.

104	The gully junction	Below a 5 m waterfall/ledge, best access from W bank of gully
